Dermot's Book

The Mooneys

Patrick Mooney

Ballyfin / Grennan Estate / settled in a house overlooking River Nore

Known as Mooney's Gardens / still called that now

Dermot now pasture / but probably found foundations under grass

Not known what happened to him except

m. Margaret Coffee who lived on a farm nearby

Two sons are known

William - my ancestor – 2 x great grandfather

Andrew - Niamh's ancestor – 3 x great grandfather

Niamh and I are 4th cousins once removed

William Mooney

b. 15 May 1803

Griffith's Valuation 1852

C. 1843 moved house nearby / ¼ mile / built by William / one room

20 acres on

m. Lizzie Butler

d. 1885 / Lizzie survived him and appears to have carried on the

farm

5 children

Andrew (died young)

William - DMP

John – my great grandfather

Mary

Judith

First known principal of Girl's School

taught her own nephews and nieces

Dermot's father knew her well / rapped pupils / head with / ruler

m. Edward Dowling

John Mooney

b. May 1830

Joined RIC in 14 Sep 1852

Left RIC in 1882 as a Sergeant after 30 years' service

Returned to live on the family farm at Attanagh

m. Elizabeth McCabe

9 children

Mary (died an infant)

John (died an infant)

William - RIC

Elizabeth Mary

Catharine

Judith Esther who married John Dorgan

Patrick Joseph (my grandfather) - RIC

James – stonemason who probably built most of the walls in

Attanagh

Andrew Martin - RIC

Elizabeth died in 1907 when her husband John was 77

Farm / sons / Land Laws / tenancy / daughter/ John Dorgan/

in exchange for free maintenance for the rest of his life / 1909 / Ballouskill / family erected headstone

At some point the Land Laws changed and the Dorgans were able to buy it.

The land eventually passed to Dermot Dorgan who farmed it until about 6 years ago when he found a tenant.

Patrick Joseph Mooney (my grandfather)

Grew up in Attanagh

RIC career becoming a Head Constable

Forces to retire in 1922 when the RIC was disbanded as part of the agreement negotiated by Michael Collins

Lived in New Ross and I knew him and my grandmother / visits / walks / chocolate tree

She was a Kennedy and family tradition has it that she was connected to the American Kennedys / Kennedy Homestead nearby / Pres John F K / visited New Ross and Homestead in 1963 / so we live in hope that the connection is found

(Story)

During the troubles he was stationed at Rosbercon just across the River Barrow from New Ross. As a policeman his job was to seek out and arrest wrongdoers of all kind but he never caught anyone connected with the troubles at all. His wife, my grandmother, who was a stanch supporter of all things Irish, would have them hidden in the house whilst granddad was out about his duties. I'll never know now but I like to think that they had worked out what to do between them.
